His role includes dealing with resident queries, setting service charge estimates, reviewing year end accounts, carrying out site visits and managing major projects. He also has to attend regular training to remain up to date with laws and legislation within the sector.



"I currently have a portfolio of 21 developments, however one of those developments is actually 13 smaller developments so the grand total is 33. You will see me on site usually once a month."

"Premier have a huge wealth of experience as managing agents," says Ed, "with managers, coordinators, admin staff accountants and more, from all walks of life. Between us there is a huge amount of knowledge."

Ed also brings excellent experience to the job too, including an RHS Diploma in Horticulture as well as property management qualifications. "When I am not at work I love to spend time with my two beautiful daughters, I also play semi-professional rugby every week.


'Westcountryman', a professional countryman and orchard specialist, as well as seasoned wassailer, led the
